I was joined by our dedicated Lay Delegates, Polly Gallagher and Fran Bowman. It was a joy to capture a moment with my husband, Rev. Sungho Lee, who will commence his service to our two sister churches – Byron UMC and Antioch UMC – on July 1st.



Insights from the Conference

The conference was presided over by our new bishop, Sandy K. Olwine. Her presence was marked by incredible energy, joyful smiles, and an inviting demeanor. I found her approach very refreshing and believe her embrace of everyone present will be instrumental in fostering healing from the hurts and divisions experienced over the past three years, especially in the wake of recent conflicts, the bishop's trial, and subsequent return.

The overarching theme for this year's conference was "Thriving in Community." This theme invites us to consider its implications for us as a local church and as the broader Body of Christ at the Conference level.

Acknowledging Bishop Sally Dyck's Service

On the second day, we were honored by a visit from Bishop Sally Dyck. We conveyed our profound gratitude for her unwavering support and guidance throughout the challenging last three years. Though officially retired, her commitment to our Conference during a period of episcopal absence was a testament to her dedication.

Bishop Dyck offered a poignant reflection (which I have paraphrased), encouraging us with these words: "Do your work even though your Conference is messy. God is with us and still wants us to do the work God has called us to do! Serve the community, lead the church, love your people! Our Journey of Thriving

Her words resonate deeply with our own experience. We have not only survived but, in a real sense, are thriving. This resilience stems from being "motivated, purposeful, resilient, and connected," aligning with a key aspect of Merriam-Webster's definition of thriving. While we may have encountered setbacks and faced decline, our hope and future have never been extinguished. In a way, we have undergone a period of "exile," yet like the Israelites, we have found ways to thrive even in challenging circumstances.

A Timeless Promise of Hope

The Lord's message to the Israelites in Exile in Babylon, found in Jeremiah 29:10-14, offers profound comfort and guidance:

"For thus says the Lord: Only when Babylon's seventy years are completed will I visit you, and I will fulfill to you my promise and bring you back to this place. For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. Then when you call upon me and come and pray to me, I will hear you. When you search for me, you will find me; if you seek me with all your heart, I will let you find me, says the Lord, and I will restore your fortunes and gather you from all the nations and all the places where I have driven you, says the Lord, and I will bring you back to the place from which I sent you into exile."

Remaining Steadfast in Hope

I recognize that some dear siblings in Christ may feel as though they are in their own "exile" due to difficult life situations. Let us remain steadfast in our hope, trusting that God is ever-present, hears our prayers, and will ultimately lead us to our promised place. The faithfulness of the Lord ensures that our prayers and ordinary days are never in vain. In God, all is well.

I enjoy so much the time I spend with our children at Sunday School! They are eager to learn more about God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit. As we talk and share together, they are musing about the lives of the Bible characters, their circumstances and their choices. They ask funny and deep questions about the meaning of things. Seeing their faces light up with understanding is the greatest joy.

We have one class that includes late 3 yr. olds to 11-year-old students. Attendance currently ranges from 3-10 students. There are 4 teachers who rotate through the month. Curriculum is provided.

I invite you to join in this experience as our Sunday School classes become larger. To strengthen our Sunday School, I need:

- 1-2 additional adults to teach 5th Sundays and Substitute. Curriculum is provided

Lay Leader News By Heidi Stark

Much has happened since my breast cancer diagnosis on May 16. I had a lumpectomy on May 29; the surgeon removed the whole tumor with clear margins and took lymph nodes for testing. My recovery went well, and I met with my oncologist on June 20. After further pathology on my tumor and lymph nodes, my cancer is now considered 3A Triple Negative Invasive Ductal Carcinoma. The tumor was bigger than the original imaging indicated, and cancer was found in one of the five lymph nodes that were taken. This cancer is aggressive but **curable**. I'm thankful to have a medical team planning the best course of action for my cancer situation, and I have a positive prognosis. My treatment plan is aggressive; I will start chemo on August 5 and receive 16 rounds. The first phase is quite intense and will be given every two weeks for 4 treatments. The second phase will be given weekly for 12 weeks. If all goes well, I will complete my chemo in December. I will get a break to recover and start radiation early in 2026 which will be 5 days a week for at least three weeks. It's a lot, and I admit that I'm frightened, but I have much to live for and I know God is with me through all of this.

I miss being at BCUMC and spending time with all of you lovely people. I miss being able to worship in person, but I am thankful to be able to watch our Sunday services online. I miss fellowships and meetings and events, but I am doing what is necessary to beat my cancer and get healthy. It is going to be a journey, and I may not be able to attend Church in person for many months, but I want you all to know that I appreciate all the cards, notes, emails, texts, calls, flowers, books, gifts, visits and meals. More than anything I appreciate your prayers for me and my family. I am blessed to have the love, support and prayers of my family, friends, Church, and so many people I don't even know lifting me up. I am thankful!

I am still able to participate in the United Women in Faith Secret Sister Summer of Surprises. I have been able to send small gifts and notes to my Secret Sister, and I have received gifts and notes from mine. The first gift I received from my Secret Sister was a deck of cards with affirmations on them. I have the deck by my bed and each morning I turn over a new card. On June 20, the day I met with my oncologist, the card I turned over was **you can and you will**. While my treatment plan was not what my family and I had hoped for it is what it is. This chapter of life is challenging, and I am striving to give it all over to God and trust his plan. I wish this wasn't happening; I don't want this, but I can do hard things. I can and I will fight! Looking forward to being with you all in person as soon as I possibly can.
